


Hermitage Neighbourhood Plan Green Spaces Audit January 2023



Name and address	Description and purpose	Quality of facility (including any deficiencies)
Dines Way Green RG18 9TF	Informal, grassed open space containing oak trees protected by a tree preservation order extensively used by local dog owners, children and occasionally for informal street events"	Bordered by the road on one side, 1.8m close boarded fence, recently replaced on another and houses. Partially surveilled. The grass is mown regularly and trees surveyed every 2 years.
Hermitage Green play area RG18 9SL	Grassy area including children's playground, overlooked by housing on all sides. The play area itself is surrounded by a small area of landscaping containing bushes, shrubs and some 14 young trees. It consists of a number of items of play equipment securely mounted within a child-safe, 1.2m high fenced area with latched entrance gates. This play area is both popular and very well used by children during summer months.	Encircled by roads, therefore casual surveillance is possible. The grass is mown regularly and hedges kept trimmed. Trees when damaged or diseased have been replaced in the past by West Berkshire Council (WBC). The playground equipment has been subject to annual health & safety inspections & repairs as necessary by WBC.
Lipscomb Close Green RG18 9SZ	Informal, grassed open space containing trees protected by a tree preservation order, including acer Drumondii, lime oak sycamore and oak monolith and Millennium memorial including time capsule. This informal space is used by residents for informal celebrations and youngsters for football.	Bordered by roads on two sides, therefore casual surveillance is possible, close boarded fence on others, including an eco pile of the arisings from making the monolith safe and some houses. The grass is mown regularly. Trees are surveyed every 2 years

Pinewood playground RG18 9RP



Children's playground in informal grassed open space mostly mowed but some left for wildlife reasons, surrounded by and including trees including elm, oak, Scots pine, silver birch and whitebeam. Refurbished in 2005. A number of pieces of equipment The Scout hut is in the park. Very well used by the Cub Pack, offering a safe enclosed area to run a large number of weekly sessions/activities.

The area is encircled with trees and partially surveilled by CCTV from the Scout Hut. Most of the grass is mown regularly. Some is retained for biodiversity The single ended MUGA needs replacing because of weld failure.

Weekly checks are undertaken by the council's contractor, monthly ones by a councillor and annual health and safety checks by a ROSPA approved contractor. Trees are surveyed every 2 years

Furze Hill Recreation Ground RG18 9WL



This is a space that is well used for dog walking, regular junior football training and matches by a local football club, exercise classes and informal recreation. The multi use games area is popular with local youngsters. This is a wonderful community space and ever more important when it comes to staying healthy. It is also a centre for village activities such as fetes.

The recreation ground is surrounded by embankments on 2 sides, woods to the east and is close to the Village Hall and carpark to the south.

There are 2 benches on the embankment.

Furze Hill Local Wildlife Site RG18 9WL



The site includes a butterfly meadow and woods, some of which is open to the public, some closed for the safety of both people and resident wildlife. It also includes the Eling Way, a very popular and well used active travel route. The whole site is subject to a tree preservation order. Residents enjoy walking their dogs and seeing the flora and fauna which are often commented on in social media. It is even used for training the captive birds of prey owned by a villager.

This is an excellent and varied open space adjacent to the recreation ground bordered on the north by the M4 motorway, fields to the east and housing and a road to the south. Wildflowers such as wood anemone, bluebells, primroses and sanicle bloom in the woods in the spring. A health and safety inspection is made on the trees every 2 years. Many ash trees have recently been removed because of ash die back. The meadow has orchids amongst many other flowers in the summer.
